(The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a.m)

CHAIRMAN DONNELLY:

Good morning, all, and welcome to this March 12 meeting of the Suffolk County Legislature's Public Safety Committee. I'd ask you all to please rise for a salute to the flag led by Legislator William Spencer.

(Pledge of Allegiance)

Please remain standing for a moment of silence in honor of all those in our military who are serving both here and abroad as well as all first responders throughout our nation and all those suffering from the Coronavirus.

(Moment of Silence Observed)

Thank you. Please be seated. Once again, good morning and welcome to this Thursday, March 12 meeting of the Suffolk County Legislature's Public Safety Committee. I do not have any correspondence addressed to the committee this morning. I have no cards for public comments. Would anybody like to address the committee this morning? Please step forward. Nobody? Okay. Thank you. We have no appointments and no presentations, so we're going to move directly to our agenda.

We'll start with tabled resolution **1024, Directing the Suffolk County Sheriff's Office to post certain signage outside of interview rooms at correctional facilities. (Gonzalez)**. Motion to table by Legislator Fleming. Second by Legislator Gonzalez. All in favor? Opposed? Abstentions? Motion is carried. **Tabled (VOTE: 9-0-0-0)**.

Moving to Introductory Resolutions. We have Introductory Resolution **1207, Appropriating funds for the purchase of equipment for Med-Legal Investigations and Forensic Sciences (CP 1132). (Co. Exec.)**. I'll take a motion from Legislator Kennedy. Seconded by Legislator Berland to approve. All in favor? Opposed? Abstentions? Motion is carried. **Approved (VOTE: 9-0-0-0)**.

Introductory Resolution 1208, Appropriating funds in connection with the Implementation of the District Attorney Crime Fighting Technology Project (CP 3528). (Co. Exec.). Motion from Legislator Gonzalez. Seconded by Legislator Fleming to approve. All in favor? Opposed? Abstentions? Motion is carried. **Approved (VOTE: 9-0-0-0)**.

Introductory Resolution 1211, Appropriating funds in connection with the purchase of replacement Public Safety Vehicles (CP 3512). (Co. Exec.) Motion by Legislator Hahn. Seconded by Legislator Gonzalez. On the motion, Legislator Sunderman.

LEG. SUNDERMAN:

Good morning. Do we know what these vehicles are for and what they are going to be assigned to?

1 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

2 The breakdown here for the 2020 is going to be 95 Ford Explorers
3 for the police department; it's going to be six Chevy Tahoes; five
4 cargo vans; and six motorcycles. Looks like according to this
5 breakdown -- this is from DPW -- looks like all marked vehicles.

6
7 **LEG. SUNDERMAN:**

8 Thank you.

9
10 **CHAIRMAN DONNELLY:**

11 Okay. Lieutenant Calandrillo, if you could just stay there.
12 Legislator Fleming has a question not directly related to this
13 resolution, but I'm going to give her a point of personal privilege
14 to ask a couple of questions. Legislator Fleming.

15
16 **LEG. FLEMING:**

17 Thank you, Mr. Chair. Good morning, Lieutenant. Good to see you.
18 Just -- we're talking about funding. I just wanted to put the
19 question about the personal safety of officers considering what's
20 happening with the Coronavirus and the concerns of the spread of
21 Coronavirus with regard to funding. Are you aware -- I think we
22 talked a little bit in the lobby here about safety items for
23 officers themselves, folks who are out on the street: Gloves,
24 masks, goggles, what have you. I understand that they've been
25 placed in all of the sector cars. I'm just wondering if you can
26 give us an update on what that is and is there a funding line that
27 is sufficient to meet the needs to keep our officers safe and all
28 members of the department.

29
30 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

31 Yes. About four or five weeks ago, Chief Cameron put additional
32 personal protective equipment in all of the park police cars in the
33 county. We had enough in supply to be able to do that. That
34 personal protective equipment, we made kits that included masks,
35 goggles, gowns, and gloves. We had to replenish stock of some of
36 that. Those orders were placed four or five weeks ago, and I
37 believe we've received some of what we needed already. I believe
38 to get it done quickly, we used asset forfeiture funds, but we were
39 able to find the money we needed to purchase the equipment.

40
41 **LEG. FLEMING:**

42 Thank you, and thank you, Mr. Chair. I would just ask that you
43 keep us posted if there are additional needs that would require
44 legislation to increase funding, if you could let us know, I'd be
45 appreciative. Thank you.

46
47 **CHAIRMAN DONNELLY:**

48 If you could just stay close. Legislator Hahn.

49
50 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

51 I'm just curious, are each of those items single use?

52
53 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

54 Yes, and that is a concern because we could go through them pretty
55 quickly.

1 **CHAIRMAN DONNELLY:**

2 Legislator Kennedy, did you have a question?

3
4 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

5 Yes. Just going back to the bill, so it's over 100 SUVs for
6 replacement. Now are these all going to the sergeants and above,
7 or is everybody now getting an SUV? Are the POs getting an SUV,
8 too, as opposed to a car?

9
10 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

11 The POs will be getting SUVs. The car manufacturers do not make
12 the sedans anymore. They don't make police interceptors anymore,
13 So we had to -- the entire fleet's going to be the Ford Explorers.
14 That's what we're switching over to.

15
16 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

17 And is the cost -- how much does it increase between the police car
18 and --

19
20 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

21 I don't have that in front of me. I looked at it last year, and I
22 think it was around -- I'm really estimating here -- around \$3- or
23 \$4,000 difference.

24
25 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

26 That's it? Okay. That's fine.

27
28 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

29 Yeah. It wasn't as large as -- it wasn't as big as we would thing.

30
31 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

32 Okay. Thank you.

33
34 **CHAIRMAN DONNELLY:**

35 Legislator Hahn, circling back, has another question for you.

36
37 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

38 So what's the miles per gallon differential between the
39 interceptors and the Explorer? I mean, I know the interceptors had
40 a revved up, supped up engine, so obviously it didn't have a high
41 mile per gallon, but I imagine that a supped up, revved up engine
42 in an SUV would be --

43
44 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

45 That, you would have to talk to DPW or transportation.

46
47 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

48 Are any of them hybrid?

49
50 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**

51 I'm not aware. I don't believe they're hybrid.

52
53 **D.P.O. HAHN:**

54 Okay. If you could just find out about the mile per gallon and the
55 hybrid nature of them, that would be good. Thank you.

1 **CHAIRMAN DONNELLY:**

2 Anybody else? Thank you, Lieutenant.

3
4 Okay. So let's go back to our agenda. We are at resolution 1211.
5 We have a motion and a second. All in favor? Opposed?
6 Abstentions? Motion is carried. **Approved (VOTE: 10-0-0-0).**

7
8 Moving along, resolution 1212, **Appropriating funds for the purchase**
9 **of Replacement Vehicles for Med-Legal Investigations and Forensic**
10 **Sciences (CP 1138). (Co. Exec.)** Motion by Legislator Spencer.
11 Seconded by Legislator Kennedy. All in favor? Opposed?
12 Abstentions? Motion is carried. **Approved (VOTE: 10-0-0-0).**

13
14 **Introductory Resolution 1255, Directing the Suffolk County Police**
15 **Department and the District Attorney's Office to provide written**
16 **quarterly reports on the effects of bail reform in Suffolk County.**
17 **(McCaffrey)** I'll make the motion. Seconded by Legislator
18 Kennedy. All in favor? Opposed? Abstentions? Motion is
19 carried. **Approved (VOTE: 10-0-0-0).**

20
21 **Amending the reporting deadline for the Police Headquarters Task**
22 **Force. (Flotteron)** Legislator Flotteron?

23
24 **LEG. FLOTTERON:**
25 Motion.

26
27 **CHAIRMAN MCCAFFREY:**
28 Motion by Legislator Flotteron to approve. Seconded by Legislator
29 Sunderman. All in favor? Opposed? Abstentions? Motion is
30 carried. **Approved (VOTE: 10-0-0-0).**

31
32 Moving along on the agenda, we do not have any procedural motions.
33 We have no home rule message, nothing subject to call. There's no
34 need for an executive session this morning. I'll take a motion
35 from Legislator Hahn, second from Legislator Sunderman to adjourn.

36
37 You do have the floor before we adjourn.

38
39 **MS. AMENDOLA:**
40 Hi. Sorry.

41
42 **CHAIRMAN MCCAFFREY:**
43 No problem.

44
45 **MS. AMENDOLA:**
46 We do have a CN and I wanted to give P.D. a chance to just discuss
47 it before the committee if you guys had any questions on it.

48
49 **CHAIRMAN MCCAFFREY:**
50 The floor is yours, sir.

51
52
53 **LT. CALANDRILLO:**
54 Thank you. In December of 2019, we had a grant request approved by
55 the committee -- actually by the legislature. It was resolution
56 1264-2019 for the federally-funded motor carrier safety

1 administration, and what that -- I've just got to find the amount
2 of that grant. I had it in front of me. I believe it was
3 \$891,000, and it was approved on December 19. There was an
4 accounting error on this grant. When they went to input it, they
5 found the employees' benefits section of the resolution was
6 incorrect, and we need to change the coding on that. We need to
7 change it from EMT to POL to be input. So the error prevented the
8 resolution from being appropriated into the financial system.

9
10 The reason we need a CN on this, the money is being used for the
11 procurement of four vehicles: Two Ford F-350s and two Chevy
12 Tahoes. The purchase orders for the vehicles were both issued in
13 December of 2019. We would like to get this expedited so we can
14 make the funds available and then Purchasing can award the purchase
15 orders. If we wait longer, we may miss the opportunity of securing
16 the current model year on these vehicles and the cost may increase.
17 So that's the reason for the CN.

18
19 **CHAIRMAN MCCAFFREY:**

20 Okay. Reasonable enough. When the CN comes through, I'll make a
21 motion to approve. I'm sure my colleagues will do the same. Any
22 questions?

23
24 So back to our agenda. We had a motion from Legislator Hahn.
25 Second by Legislator Sunderman to adjourn. All in favor? We are
26 adjourned. Thank you everybody.
