**CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

Good afternoon, everyone, and welcome to the Veterans and Consumer Affairs Committee. I would ask everyone to please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance and then remain standing for a moment of silence. The Pledge -- let's get Legislator Rob Trotta.

**CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

Legislator Anker has an excused absence for today.

**LEG. KENNEDY:**

**DEPUTY CLERK ROBINSON:**

Six.

**CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

Thank you. Are there any correspondence, Mr. Clerk?

**DEPUTY CLERK ROBINSON:**

1 All correspondence has been distributed accordingly, Mr. Chairman.

3 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

4 Thank you. At this time, we'll enter public portion. Do we have  
5 any speakers for public portion? Do we have anybody that would  
6 like to speak, address the legislature? Seeing none, we have no  
7 appointment, no presentations, no tabled resolutions. We do have  
8 one introductory resolutions. That is IR 1397, Bond Resolution of  
9 the County of Suffolk, New York, authorizing the issuance of

11 Program for the Department of Labor, Licensing and Consumer Affairs

14 **LEG. TROTТА:**

15 Just --

17 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

18 We need a motion.

21 I'll make a motion to approve, but I have some questions about it.

22  
23 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

24 I'll second it for the purpose of discussion.

25  
26 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

27 Motion by Legislator Trotta. Second by Legislator Krupski on the  
28 motion, Legislator Trotta. Oh, James Andrews. Come on in.

29  
30 **MR. ANDREWS:**

31 Could I sit?

32  
33 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

34 Yeah, absolutely. We're going to need you, James.

35  
36 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**

37 Buckle in.

38  
39 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

40 James Andrews. I'm the administrative director for Consumer  
41 Affairs. I'd first off like to thank the entire committee -- good?

42  
43 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

44 Yeah.

45  
46 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

47 All right. It's been a while since I had to use the microphone.  
48 Usually my voice just projects.

49  
01:05PM 50 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

51 Well, welcome back, James. We appreciate you coming.

52  
53 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

54 So we are actually in the fourth phase of the ACELA project, so I  
55 would just like to first recognize and thank the committee for all  
56 the support that we've gotten in the first three phases. I could

1 tell you this program is bringing the department into the 21st  
2 century. Right now, we've just about completed our public portal,  
3 which now allows residents and vendors of this county to be able to  
4 come online, apply for a license online, renew their licenses  
5 online, check out contractors online, and the online system also  
6 provides our consumers and our constituents information on those  
7 contractors that they are checking out, whether their license is  
8 expired, whether their license has been revoked, if they've had any  
9 complaints within the last five years, if the department has  
10 leveled any violations. That has all been what the past money has  
11 been used for, and that is working very well right now, and we've  
12 had nothing but accolades for the product that we've actually put  
13 out. And I'm very happy with it because less telephone calls come  
14 into the office now because the public is finding out that we have  
15 all this information available for them and our vendors are more  
16 than pleased because now they don't have to take time off from  
17 their busy day working their jobs and trying to support their  
18 families to come in to renew a license, or someone doesn't have to  
19 take time off their day to come in and apply for a license.

21 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

22 Well, we do appreciate all that. That's great information, and  
23 we're happy that you're happy. We're happy that the efforts are  
24 moving forward and simplifying the process, but we do have some  
25 questions regarding this IR 1397. First, I will recognize  
26 Legislator Trotta.

27  
28 **LEG. TROTTA:**

29 What's concerning -- what is this additional money being used for?

31 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

32 So the next phase of this project is to bring our weights and  
33 measures, and Consumer Affairs now has living wage underneath it.  
34 I don't know if the committee is aware of that, but the living wage  
35 section of the department looks at all the county contracts to  
36 ensure compliance with prevailing wage and with the Living Wage Law  
37 of this county that is now also under Consumer Affairs.

38  
39 **LEG. TROTTA:**

40 So the -- what I don't like is \$440,000 for planning.

41  
42 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

43 So that probably wasn't written up correctly. What this money will  
44 cover is -- is everyone familiar with our weights and measures  
45 division? Our weights and measures division goes out in the  
46 county, and we look at every scale, pump, and meter. We monitor.  
47 Right now, we're very popular because of the gasoline situation  
48 that's going on right now, so that's what Weights and Measures  
49 does. They go out into stores to make sure that pricing is  
50 correct, when you pick up five pounds of chicken, you're getting  
51 five pounds of chicken and what you pay for.

53 So all of the things that are covered under our weights and  
54 measures division are currently being done in two computer  
55 programs: An older program that they've used for years called  
56 WinWam and they use an access program also. So what we're trying

1 to did with this money is this money will include taking our  
2 weights and measures division, and the local law compliance piece  
3 of our department out and incorporating them into the ACELA program  
4 so we can be one department, one division under ACELA and have all  
5 of our work coordinated that way.

6  
7 **LEG. TROTТА:**

8 Who's performing -- who are you contracting with to do this, I  
9 mean?

11 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

12 So IT, I believe, will have to put out a bid for work on this.

13  
14 **LEG. TROTТА:**

15 So this is something totally independent of anything else.

16  
17 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

18 What do you mean by "independent"?

20 **LEG. TROTТА:**

21 This new section, this new \$470,000 doesn't relate to licensing or  
22 doesn't relate -- it's an independent -- it's going to be on the  
23 website?

24  
25 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

26 Well, what this does is currently we have TLC, we have licensing,  
27 and we have complaints all in the ACELA program. Weights and  
28 Measures takes complaints in. Weights and Measures writes  
29 violations, Weights and Measures holds hearings. Local Law  
30 Compliance looks at all the county contracts to make sure that  
31 vendors, who some of them are actually our license holders, are in  
32 compliance with the rules on the prevailing wage and living wage.

34 **LEG. TROTТА:**

35 What are we spending \$470,000 on? That's what I want to know.

36  
37 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

38 We're taking these two sections of Consumer Affairs and bringing  
39 them into the ACELA format. So all of the Consumer Affairs work  
40 that's done can be all coordinated under one roof. The ACELA  
41 program is also used by the health department right now for their  
42 liquid waste program with the IA systems that are currently out  
43 there. DPW is coming onboard with the ACELA program for all their  
44 contracts and stuff of that nature, so as a county, it would be  
45 nice if we could all be in the same computer program to access each  
46 other's information.

49 Is this the last phase?

51 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

52 For Consumer Affairs, yes; yes, sir.

53  
54 **LEG. TROTТА:**

55 So how do you -- I mean, I guess --

1 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

2 So \$30,000 of that money is for additional equipment that's needed  
3 to continue the work that we're doing ACELA because --

4

5 **LEG. TROTТА:**

6 And 440 is for what?

7

8 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

9 440 is to pay programmers to come in and take -- convert our  
10 historical data that we currently have in our two divisions, so all  
11 that historical data now has to be converted into the ACELA format  
12 and then the work that these divisions perform now has to come into  
13 ACELA and it has to be mapped out, so when staff is out in the  
14 field --

17 So it's safe to say "planning" was the wrong word. It would be --  
18 what's the word?

21 "Planning" was actually not the correct word to use.

24 Implementation.

25

26 **LEG. TROTТА:**

27 Implementation.

28

29 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

30 Implementation. Correct. Thank you, Legislator Piccirillo.

31

32 **LEG. TROTТА:**

33 All right. You can swallow it a little better when it's something  
34 like that.

35

36 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

37 I can assure you, Legislator Trotta, that I would not put something  
38 on this committee that is --

39

40 **LEG. TROTТА:**

41 I know you and I are on the same cheapness.

42

43 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

44 -- not going to benefit this county and the constituents of this  
45 county. I don't like to spend money frivolously.

46

47 **LEG. TROTТА:**

48 I don't doubt that. I just didn't like the -- I hate the planning  
49 word with big money next to it.

51 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**

52 "Planning" wasn't a good word.

53

54 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**

55 Legislator Krupski, did you have anything that you wanted to ask?

56

1 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**  
2 No, I didn't. Thank you.

3  
4 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**  
5 Okay. So based on the information and based on how everything is  
6 written up, I don't think -- it's being recommended that we make a  
7 motion to table this so we can get even the backup information  
8 correctly -- written correctly so what we vote on is in actuality  
9 what it really is. So with that --

12 Motion to table, Mr. Chairman. I just think that before we vote on  
13 a document that's binding that the language needs to be correct and  
14 the backup documentation needs to be fixed. I don't want to speak  
15 for all my colleagues, but you have the support of of us here, but  
16 we need to make sure all our Ts are crossed and Is are dotted  
17 before we go ahead to approve this, okay?

19 **DIRECTOR ANDREWS:**  
20 Okay.

21  
22 **LEG. PICCIRILLO:**  
23 Thank you very much.

24  
25 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**  
26 We have a motion to table. Is there a second?

27  
28 **LEG. TROTТА:**  
29 Second.

31 **CHAIRMAN CARACAPPA:**  
32 Second by Legislator Trotta, which takes precedence so we'll vote  
33 on the tabling first. All in favor of tabling IR 1397? Any
